Why should I become a Mentor?

According to the Institute for Learning (IfL) "a growing body of research on CPD has shown that the kinds of professional development which makes the most difference to practice are based on professional dialogue about teaching and learning, and the improvement of practice through a variety of activities, including coaching, *mentoring*, shadowing and peer-support". They also list "mentoring new colleagues", "peer observation" and "team-teaching" as ways of updating your teaching and learning skills. In addition any time spent as a mentor and reflecting on the process can count towards your annual CPD.
