# 6 Course Description

Royal Birmingham Conservatoire is a multidisciplinary arts education institution that provides exceptional training for the musicians, actors, stage managers and performers of the future. As part of Birmingham City University, the Conservatoire is able to offer a stimulating creative environment with limitless opportunities for collaboration and depth of experience. The Music Division of Royal Birmingham Conservatoire offers vocational musical training in performance, composition, music technology and jazz at undergraduate and postgraduate levels. We are dedicated to ensuring that each student reaches their full potential and leaves us prepared for a successful career in the challenging arts industry.

The BMus (Hons) Jazz course is a specialist course for performers in jazz. Its main aim is to prepare students for a career in the music profession in the field of jazz. At the heart of our course's philosophy is the ideal of the informed musician, someone who is able to combine both advanced skills and musical knowledge in the advancement of their musical career. The BMus (Hons) Jazz course therefore aims to develop the specialist skills, the theoretical, historical and practice-based knowledge and to encourage the individual creativity required for you to become an independent learner, a critical thinker and a reflective practitioner.

Future performers in Jazz will face very exacting demands upon their musicianship. They will be expected to be original yet show an understanding of their tradition, spontaneous yet show the ability to adhere to harmonic and structural systems and also be a soloist showing great individuality while being equally adept at ensemble work. These are the diverse and contrasting abilities demanded of the professional Jazz musician. The course recognises the need for Jazz performers to have a highly developed approach to creativity reinforced by a thorough grasp of musical techniques.

Whilst performance and composition remain at the heart of the course, students have opportunities to develop skills both in complementary areas of performance and in other disciplines according to their specific needs. The course provides a secure foundation for postgraduate study and entry into the profession.

#### 13 Overall Student Workload and Balance of Assessment
