



## Managing your money

#### **How it works**

- First, you need to decide on a university choice that you intend to study at
- Then you must work your way through each 'outgoing', and roughly estimate how much you predict you will spend per week on that particular outgoing
- At the end, you will subtract all your combined outgoings from your total income to see if you have budgeted successfully







- I want to study at Birmingham City University, and I will be living in halls of residence/at home (remove as appropriate)
- I will only travel home in the holidays by train
- I will do my food shopping at Aldi
- I enjoy going out with my mates, probably once or twice a week
- I will only treat myself to clothes at the end of every term













- The following amounts are what it might cost, per week, using the example provided earlier
- Don't change what you have put down, as there are no right or wrong answers everybody's circumstances will be different
- This will give you a good guide to how much certain things can cost at university, but it is important to remember that these figures will be different depending on where you are studying

For this example, rent might cost £540pcm (per calendar month). As you will normally pay rent monthly, you have to divide it by four for the purposes of this activity.
