6	Course Description
	The one-year Graduate Diploma course is a two-semester pre-Masters course in jewellery and related products suitable for both art and design graduates or applicants from other design disciplines or educational and cultural backgrounds suited to the subject. Students will enhance the breadth and depth of their portfolio, specifically in the field of contemporary jewellery, to better enable progression onto MA or other higher level study.
	The aim is to encourage creative studio practice that develops confidence in self-directed study and independent learning skills, thereby acquiring and enabling professional development and academic progression.
	You will gain knowledge and understanding of industry through visits along with hands-on experience of technical processes through the demonstrations and use of machinery available within the school. You will develop your understanding of historical and theoretical underpinnings of contemporary jewellery through gallery visits alongside regular lecture and seminar sessions. You are encouraged to identify and develop your own specific interests in the field. You will be guided through developing critical reflective skills whilst enhancing your competence in sustaining and in-depth studio material practice within the specifics of jewellery and related product studio techniques and processes. The course requires a significant amount of technical and studio based teaching to help you gain an understanding of materials and processes. The course will help you develop modelling and prototypes skills and design thinking, as well as communication skills through presenting your work and ideas to your peers and tutors. Participating in critical feedback sessions and recording reflections of your progress and development is core to this course of study and will help prepare you for future desired progression.
	The course culminates in an end of year exhibition within the School alongside other final year undergraduate students.

13 Overall Student Workload and Balance of Assessment
