6 Course Description

For delivery of this course, applicants need to come from organisations who have a formal agreement with Birmingham City University to deliver this course, which would require a minimum of 10 students.

This multi-professional, clinically focused course provides an internationally recognised Postgraduate Certificate, Diploma and Master's award. The course is suitable and relevant to all nurses, midwives and members of allied health professions, in or outside of the UK, who want to retain an influence on clinical care but may also like to have more involvement with strategic development of services design and reconfiguration.

During this course you will develop your knowledge and skills to improve the design and delivery of services, expand your educational and leadership roles and meet the rising expectation of health care in local populations.

What's covered in the course?

This course is renowned for providing excellent tutorial support to ensure that nurses, midwives and allied health professionals relate to the practice and senior roles.

As an existing health professional, you will be able to use the course to develop your knowledge and skills in healthcare and expand on educational roles. You will develop analytical skills through interactive classes and lectures, so that you are able to critically examine practices within the context of legislative and professional frameworks of your own country.

You will learn from professional lecturers who maintain 'cutting edge' knowledge of policy developments related to Advanced Practice, as members of national committees and international consultations with healthcare colleagues. Our lecturers are actively involved in research and publications related to advanced practice and other senior roles.

The modules will allow you to explore your employment situation, recognise the potential for career progression, and identify ways in which you can improve practice and services or pioneer new developments.

In addition, you will have the opportunity to pursue particular profession specific topics of your choice in greater depth. The modules incorporate ethical practice and the role of the advanced



practice professional in creating and maintaining an ethical working environment; legal dimensions of practice will also be addressed.

11	Course Learning Outcomes
1	This course aims to produce critically reflective, competent and innovative advanced practitioners, building on existing knowledge and clinical skills development, ensuring critical analysis of practice in order to develop and deliver safe effective and efficient care.
2	Practice-led knowledge is applied to students' specific field of practice by developing the key attributes for advanced practitioners, namely leadership, facilitation of learning, research /



	development, and advanced professional practice, in order to continually improve service user outcomes.
3	The course aims to promote the development of collaborative inter-professional relationships through leadership and team working, demonstrating consideration of the impact of their own and others professional roles within the health or social care organisation.
4	This course is embedded in employability. It aims to facilitate and consolidate the demonstration of the knowledge, skills and attributes required for the Advanced Practice role as identified locally, nationally and internationally.
5	Appreciation of the global perspective of health care in relation to formulation of policy, professional role development and consideration of wider research and evidence base which influences practice will be inherent within the course. The course has well-established international partnerships currently with the Netherlands, and others are under discussion.
6	The course lends itself to the international market, as the importance of advanced clinical skills and the role of advanced practitioners is recognised and being developed in many countries.

13 Overall Student Workload and Balance of Assessment

Overall student *workload* consists of class contact hours, independent learning and assessment activity, with each credit taken equating to a total study time of around 10 hours. While actual contact hours may depend on the optional modules selected, the following information gives an indication of how much time students will need to allocate to different activities at each level of the course.

- Scheduled Learning includes lectures, practical classes and workshops, contact time specified in timetable
- *Directed Learning* includes placements, work-based learning, external visits, on-line activity, Graduate+, peer learning
- Private Study includes preparation for exams

The *balance of assessment* by mode of assessment (e.g. coursework, exam and in-person) depends to some extent on the optional modules chosen by students. The approximate percentage of the course assessed by coursework, exam and in-person is shown below.
