6	Course Description
	If you are an intending professional performer, postgraduate study at a conservatoire is an accepted part of your training. If you have another specialism – Composition, Music Technology or Experimental Performance – the conservatoire environment offers you a special context in which to develop your craft, with a multitude of opportunities to collaborate with each other, performers and musicologists.
	While it is a characteristic of conservatoire study (at any level) that the Principal Study area is at the heart of things, and that advanced skills in this specialist area are a pre-requisite for a successful career in the music profession, it is important that you are equipped with a range of additional essential attributes – especially given the likelihood that you will find yourself having a freelance, portfolio career which relies on self-motivation and good organizational skills.
	The principal aim of our Master of Music (hereafter MMus) courses is to send you out of Royal Birmingham Conservatoire with the knowledge, skills and confidence to succeed in your chosen branch(es) of the music profession, giving you a head-start in addressing the challenges involved in becoming a professional musician in the twenty-first century.
	A distinctive feature of Royal Birmingham Conservatoire's postgraduate provision is that it will give you the opportunity to make choices within your course directly relevant to your future career aspirations, both within your Principal Study area and in your supporting studies. Alongside your work in your specialist area, you will select three options from a broad and varied menu of 20-credit 'professional development options', and a fourth from a list of 40-credit 'research-based options'. We will spend a considerable amount of time at the start of your course introducing these choices, encouraging you to think about your future career plan and guiding you in your decision-making so that you complete the course well prepared to pursue your chosen career path. Our Career Development module is designed to help you make such plans.
	Royal Birmingham Conservatoire is a friendly, welcoming and highly supportive environment which enables our students get the most out of their time with us. Furthermore, we belong to Birmingham City University's Faculty of Arts, Design and Media, which provides many opportunities for collaboration and interdisciplinary projects that can be factored into your course or undertaken as part of your wider professional development alongside your formal studies.

In the case of the 12-month route (with credit for advanced standing), a student will take all the modules except the one(s) for which credit for prior learning or experience (RPL) has been granted. There will be some negotiation of the standard assessment dates so that the workload is spread manageably across the period of study.



#### 13 Overall Student Workload and Balance of Assessment

Overall student *workload* consists of class contact hours, independent learning and assessment activity, with each credit taken equating to a total study time of around 10 hours. While actual contact hours may depend on the optional modules selected, the following information gives an indication of how much time students will need to allocate to different activities at each level of the course.

- Scheduled Learning includes lectures, practical classes and workshops, contact time specified in timetable
- *Directed Learning* includes placements, work-based learning, external visits, on-line activity, Graduate+, peer learning
- Private Study includes preparation for exams

The *balance of assessment* by mode of assessment (e.g. coursework, exam and in-person) depends to some extent on the optional modules chosen by students. The approximate percentage of the course assessed by coursework, exam and in-person is shown below.
