MUSIC

Our state-of-the-art music building is the first of its kind in the digital age. We have invested £57 million into 9,000 sq m of the most impressive teaching and performance facilities in the UK, with the aim of achieving the perfect balance of functionality, aesthetic impact and acoustical engineering. This investment presented us with a unique opportunity to advance how music is taught and performed in the digital age

Our music building houses five public performance spaces, known collectively as the 'Eastside Venues', including the 500-seat Bradshaw Hall and intimate 150-seat Recital Hall. It also features a black box experimental performance space called The Lab, an Organ Studio, seven industry-standard recording studios, mastering and editing suites, and the Eastside Jazz Club.

ACTING AND APPLIED THEATRE

In the 2022/23 academic year, our School of Acting will be moving to new premises, just a short walk away from the University's City Centre Campus. The School's new home will offer teaching, rehearsal and performance spaces, including a Studio Theatre.

The School also has access to facilities in the Parkside Building at the City Centre Campus and rehearsal spaces at the Doug Ellis Sports Centre in Perry Barr.

We use professional external venues for most public performances, which means you will benefit from regular opportunities to perform in theatres around the city. Venues have previously included the Crescent Theatre, Birmingham Hippodrome, The Old Rep Theatre and mac Birmingham.

You can also take advantage of the facilities we enjoy through being part of Birmingham City University. For example, Birmingham School of Media houses TV and radio studios and a giant green screen, giving our actors varied experience that covers stage, screen and radio techniques, all of which make up their intensive professional training.

STAGE MANAGEMENT

Our Stage Management course is distinctive, partly because we make sure our students get hands-on industry experience from the moment they arrive. You will benefit from a dedicated facility close to the City Centre Campus which includes a large main workshop, wardrobe department and prop store, as well as dedicated classrooms.

BASED IN BIRMINGHAM CITY CENTRE, WE ARE WITHIN EASY REACH OF ALL THE MAJOR CONCERT VENUES AND THEATRES IN THE CITY, INCLUDING SYMPHONY HALL, TOWN HALL, BIRMINGHAM HIPPODROME, THE CRESCENT THEATRE AND THE REP. Being in the centre of the UK makes us easily accessible by road, rail and air, and allows our students effortless transport links to all major towns and cities in the UK, which opens up even more opportunities to find work. We are within easy reach of London (90 minutes by train) and Stratford-upon-Avon (30 minutes by car). Birmingham is the UK's second-largest city and offers our students the chance to live in a diverse, forward-looking location with exciting food and entertainment at a lower living cost than London. The city is home to people from a range of different cultures and ethnic groups.

The friendly population is what makes Birmingham the dynamic, multicultural city that it is – and also the youngest major city in Europe with under-20s accounting for 29% of its population (West Midlands Growth Company 2021) – offering a heady mix of galleries, music, restaurants and bars.

We are one of 20 member institutions of the Federation of Drama Schools a professional organisation established to enable prospective students to identify high guality, intensive, vocational training for performers. directors, designers and technicians.

We also have close relationships with many of the theatres in Birmingham. including The Old Rep, Birmingham Hippodrome and The Crescent - all venues where our students have opportunities to perform. Being located only a short journey away from the famous theatres of Stratfordupon-Avon and within easy travelling distance to London has allowed students on our Stage Management course to gain work experience in venues such as the Royal Opera House and theatres in the West End.

Our Applied Theatre course has partnerships with a list of more than 60 professional companies in the small-scale performance sector in the city, alongside strong links nationally and internationally. We also have a special partnership with The Birmingham Rep theatre, enabling students to work with its team of directors and outreach workers, and aim for the highest possible standards of performance and participation.

Birmingham is a vibrant cultural hub, and Royal Birmingham Conservatoire is a key part of this ever-developing cultural landscape. Getting accepted onto a course at any conservatoire or drama school is challenging, and ours is no different. Places on all courses are limited and you will be required to go through a process of auditions or interviews before you are offered a place.

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
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We stage productions in professional theatres and public spaces, in front of diverse audiences. Away from the stage, our courses introduce actors to radio and screen techniques, and to working with classical and contemporary texts, including musical theatre.

Our Stage Management students are integral to the School of Acting, working on every internal and external production, with increasing responsibility as the course progresses. As Stage Management students you undertake at least one professional work placement during your training – recent destinations have included the Royal Opera House and the Royal Shakespeare Company. We encourage you to take part in as many placements as you can so that you can engage with ideas and theories in a practical setting, while developing your communication skills and working in an authentic environment.

Applied Theatre students are immediately immersed in one of the most exciting areas of contemporary theatre practice through frequent practical work. You will regularly work away from the Conservatoire with young people, community groups, hospitals and prisons, and with a wide range of participants. We believe that creating passionate new theatre with social and political objectives can have a significant impact on the lives of individuals and communities.

1. Nicola Coughlan, 2011

Nicola became a Netflix sensation when she was cast as Penelope Featherington in period drama Bridgerton. She is also set to return to our screens this year in her role as Clare Devlin in Channel 4's sitcom *Derry* Girls. Nicola has also created her own hit podcast with an all-star cast titled Whistle Through The Shamrocks.

2. Charlene James, 2003

Playwright Charlene was awarded the Alfred Fagan Award and the George Devine Award for her play Cuttin' It. as well as winning a BBC Audio Drama award for the radio adaptation of the same play. She was then awarded the Charles Wintour Award for Most Promising Playwright at the Evening Standard Theatre Awards 2016. She has also written on Doctor Who. A Discovery of Witches and The Rising. She is currently developing original pieces for World Productions, BBC and Channel 4.

3. Rob Mallard. 2014

Rob has played Daniel Osbourne in ITV's Coronation Street since 2016 Rob was awarded the Best Newcomer Award at the British Soap Awards in 2017 and was nominated for Best Soap Actor at the TV Choice Awards in 2020.

4. Lewis Howard, 2012

Lewis played the role of the Heart of Joey in War Horse, the National Theatre plav based on the award winning novel by Michael Morpurgo. The play went on a national tour, visiting UK cities such as Birmingham, Bristol, Cardiff, Edinburgh, Liverpool, Nottingham and Plymouth, before closing in Glasgow in February 2019.

5. Jordan Goff, 2011

Since graduating from the BA (Hons) Stage Management course, Jordan has constantly been in demand for largescale musicals. He has toured China as Stage Manager with the West End productions of The Bodyguard and CATS, and has also toured with big shows in the UK, such as *Sister Act*, Hairspray and Singin' in the Rain. He is currently Technical Stage Manager for the Dirty Dancing International Tour.

6. Dominic Hartley Harris,

Dom has previously starred as George Washington in the West End production of *Hamilton*, as well as in Beautiful – the Carol King Musical and he has also played the lead role of Jagwire in Bat out of Hell. He recently played the role of Collins in Rent at Manchester's Hope Mill Theatre and is now playing Curtis Taylor Jr in the first UK tour of the musical Dreamgirls.

Philip is Youth Theatre Director at Birmingham Rep. in ITV drama Viewpoint. She has also taken part in BBC's Strictly Come Dancing and was made an Honorary Fellow of the Conservatoire in 2018. 9. Together they have grown the size of the theatre school by over 400% since they took over, winning awards along the way including Best New Franchisees and Best Marketing Campaign.

Alexia is currently starring as Anne of Cleves in the massively successful musical Six. based on the lives of Henry VIII's wives. Alexia was nominated for an Olivier Award for her role, along with the other 'Queens' (Best actress in a supporting role in a musical).

FOUNDATION COURSE IN ACTING/

This course, with two pathways of delivery to choose from, allows you to increase your skills in and awareness of auditioning, and discover the essential requirements for many drama school auditions. While gaining increased confidence towards performing, you will also be given skills classes in voice, movement, dance and acting.

The Foundation Course in Acting, available both full-time or part-time, will give you a broad foundation in performance techniques and methods, and will be invaluable to anyone wanting to go to drama school or take up a place on a performance course at university. It is also available to those who want to expand their experience in acting before applying. Former students have gone on to train at a variety of drama schools in the UK and in the USA. The course offers the chance to be entered for a Level 3 qualification which may be worth up to 65 UCAS points.

The 20-week full-time course includes two terms of 10 weeks, each week consisting of up to 30 contact hours. With potential opportunities for professional workshops at Shakespeare's Globe theatre, plus theatre visits and visiting masterclasses, you will be given valuable insight into a challenging but exciting profession. The 34-week part-time course is delivered over three terms, two evenings per week, with six contact hours per week.

Please note: At 20 to 34 weeks in length, this Foundation Course in Acting course does not qualify for Student Loans Company funding/finance for fees or living expenses. Payment plans and school bursaries are available.

BA (Hons) Acting develops you practically, personally and professionally, and prepares you for the dynamic and challenging world of the dramatic arts. We have carefully designed a contemporary course that will prepare you for a creative career in front of a stage, screen or radio audience, including specialist training in voice, movement and singing.

We prepare you to be a professional actor and, as a vocational training course, full attendance for a minimum of 30 contact hours a week would be expected.

Our graduates have gone on to enjoy successful careers on stage and screen. They can be found working on hit TV programmes such as *Derry Girls*, *Coronation Street*, *Call the Midwife*, *Bridgerton* and *Line of Duty* as well as on stage at prestigious theatres such as The Globe, the Royal Shakespeare Company, the West End and regional theatres. We are particularly proud of the entrepreneurial skills they leave us with; we produce graduates who know how to survive and thrive in the industry, who write their own material and set up their own theatre companies such as Strictly Arts.

This unique and enterprising course is built around preparing students to create new drama with and for young people and community groups, using theatre as a way of making a real difference.

The focus is on developing all of the skills needed to create compelling new performances and valuable and effective theatre projects. You will cover all the various skills of performance - acting, movement, voice and singing - but beyond that also address the whole of theatre-making: group devising, writing, facilitation, producing, funding and administration.

You will be equipped to create your own work, telling the stories that are most important to you, and also with the skills to make it happen. The majority of what you will learn on the course will be through practical experience - working with professional practitioners - and in real contexts, out with communities responding to actual need. The final year is all about preparing for employment or freelance work as a confident and skilled practitioner.

The course currently has important partnerships with the Birmingham Repertory Theatre, Big Brum TIE Co, The Playhouse, Loudmouth, Geese, Open Theatre and more than 60 professional companies in the Birmingham area. We also have strong links with a wide range of practitioners, both nationally and internationally. In the second year, every student has a full-time placement with one of these companies for six to eight weeks, which is a crucial part of your preparation to graduate as accomplished applied theatre-makers - to go out and change the world.

The course embraces students from a wide variety of performance backgrounds and actively encourages you to develop your own areas of interest and practice. Recent students have included spoken word artists, musicians/singers, dancers and those with interests as diverse as puppetry and arts administration.

Prepare vourself for a successful career in Stage Management through in-depth, practical training. We aim to produce confident graduates who are ready for the industry as soon as they leave us.

You will develop an understanding of the core skills needed in technical theatre and design, widening your knowledge and ability to work in the fast-paced, demanding environment of stage management and further afield.

Taking on the essential duties of assistant stage manager in your first year of study, deputy stage manager in your second year, and stage manager in your final year, you will learn through authentic experience on internal productions and within the industry.

Your final year also includes a six- to eight-week placement, where you experience the rigours and responsibilities of a busy stage management job. Recent placements have included the Royal Shakespeare Company, the Royal Opera House, Birmingham Hippodrome, Birmingham Repertory Theatre and the Royal Opera House Muscat in Oman.

We encourage you to take part in as many in-house show allocations as you can so that you can engage with ideas and theories in a practical setting, while developing your communication skills and working in an authentic environment. Graduates have gone on to work on large-scale national tours such as *Les Misérables* and *Phantom of the Opera*, West End residencies like Harry Potter and the Cursed Child, and seasons at The Royal Shakespeare Company, as well as working in a variety of stage management roles within different aspects of theatre and entertainment.

Transform your career with our postgraduate qualification in acting. Designed to advance your practical and professional progress, our MA Acting course provides intense training from staff with rich industry experience.

Previous graduates of this course have gone on to succeed as established performers, including in roles at the Edinburgh Fringe Festival and the Royal Shakespeare Company.

You will be taught to maintain a high standard of skill and knowledge and how to transform into an independentlyminded performer and practitioner. We will enhance your ability to reflect and analyse, through a range of concepts and ideas. You will enhance your technical skills through practicebased study, learning and developing flexibility to confront issues that you may experience within your profession.

Your classes will mainly be practical studio-based sessions, focusing on the application of acting, voice, movement and singing. Through reading, discussion, reflective writing and practising, you will relate theory to practice and thereby learn the ways of thinking and working of a professional voice practitioner. Through engagement with the opportunities the course provides, you will be prepared for work as a voice practitioner in private practice, further or higher education, business, theatre, performing arts and media.

The starting point is to work on yourself: i.e. your voice and its source in your body and breath. It is the experiential understanding of this process and listening to your colleagues on the course that informs your own pedagogy.

Through core learning based on how the voice works, your imagination will fuel the development of your personal artistry and development. If you aspire to learn in-depth, specialist knowledge in professional voice practice, then this programme will not only teach you the skills, but broaden your vital industry connections.

The range of experience you get from playing in orchestras and ensembles will help you to develop the knowledge and flexibility required for the demands of professional music-making.

Performances sometimes take place at Symphony Hall – one of Europe's finest concert venues – as part of our close relationship with the City of Birmingham Symphony Orchestra (CBSO). We also use local cathedrals for our concerts, making the most of the excellent acoustics and surroundings available in our city. The breadth of the music you will encounter is enhanced by the opportunity to work with a variety of artists, some of whom may be permanent or visiting members of Conservatoire staff. Each artist, whether they be conductors, soloists or professional orchestra members, brings their own style to their work to engender an important learning experience for the developing professional musician.

Equally important is the opportunity to experience the reality of professional scheduling and discipline. You need to be punctual, organised and well prepared,

because this is what the music profession will demand of you. We have high expectations and wish to maintain our excellent standard of orchestral activity. Outside the Conservatoire. you will be able to audition for the CBSO Youth Orchestra, which runs three courses every year that include sectional coaching from CBSO musicians, rehearsals, and performances with leading professional conductors. In addition. the CBSO Training Scheme offers a series of masterclasses by CBSO principals as well as a sit-in scheme with the orchestra, and is the most comprehensive relationship between a symphony orchestra and conservatoire in the UK.

There are also side-by-side and participation schemes with Birmingham Royal Ballet, Welsh National Opera, Orchestra of the Swan and the Royal Shakespeare Company, allowing successful candidates to gain valuable first-hand exposure to a wide range of professional activities. You'll also find slightly more unusual ways to gain experience, like the famous Joe Broughton's Conservatoire Folk ensemble (pictured), a group unique to Royal Birmingham Conservatoire that is open to all students.

As well as being a jazz pianist, Charlie has gained a reputation as a composer and arranger. In 2017, The Charlie Bates Big Band released their debut album *Silhouettes*, which was well received by national press. He has written music for television and worked as a musical advisor on a number of productions and has also been commissioned to write music for some of the country's finest vocalists. In 2019. Charlie won the prestigious Dankworth Award for Jazz Composition and spent a year as the composer-in-residence for the National Youth Jazz Orchestra. In December 2020, it was announced that Charlie had been awarded an Ivor Novello Award. Charlie teaches at Hockerill Anglo European College in Hertfordshire and coaches big bands and jazz ensembles in specialist workshops all over the country. He also works as an examiner for the Music Teacher Board (MTB) and is currently co-writing their new jazz syllabus.

2. Owain Jenkins, 2012

After graduating from the Music Technology department, Owain set up his recording studio, StudiOwz, in the outbuildings of a working Pembrokeshire dairy farm. He has worked with many artists as an engineer and producer, including members of The Noisettes and Welsh Music Prize nominee Jodie Marie, plus fellow Conservatoire graduates Jimmy Brewerand Leo Appleyard.

3. Samantha Oxborough, 2018

In September 2017, Mezzo Soprano Samantha proudly sang as a soloist in a concert in Kineton organised by Roderick Williams for the Woman's Institute. She also sang as Zerlina in the duet *La Ci Darem La Mano* by Mozart, with Roderick as Don Giovanni. On the same day she won the Geraint Morris Award, and as a result Samantha was one of the soloists at the Festival of Massed Choirs in the Royal Albert Hall, London in May 2018. In 2019, she was selected for as one of the artists on the Young Artist Programme at the National Opera Studio.

Tom is a well-established freelance player and holds the lead trombone chair in the Svd Lawrence Orchestra. He has been Musical Director for a number of productions with the Royal Shakespeare Company, and has also performed in the RSC's Associate Schools Festival. 10. Segun Akinola, 2014

Segun Akinola composed the score for the latest series of Doctor Who As part of the BAFTA Breakthrough Brit programme in 2017, Segun was recognised as one of the rising stars among British composers. He also scored Sundance 2019 favourite The Last Tree. His other work includes scoring BBC Two's four-part series Black and British: A Forgotten History, three-part series The Human Body: Secrets of Your Life *Revealed* and two-part series Expedition Volcano, both for BBC Two and PBS.

11. Joel Hall, 2018

Since graduating with an MA in Composition, Joel has worked as a performer and composer. He is currently creating a new musical which will be staged at Lichfield Garrick Theatre in 2022. as well as working with Coventry Belgrade Theatre for the show The Last Vampire. ROYAL BIRMINGHAM CONSERVATOIRE IS CURRENTLY THE MOST EXCITING DESTINATION FOR CONDUCTORS, WITH AN ACTIVE RECORDING AND CONCERT SCHEDULE. OUR POSTGRADUATE CONDUCTING COURSES PROVIDE THE TECHNICAL TRAINING, COLLABORATIVE OPPORTUNITIES AND PODIUM TIME NECESSARY TO LAUNCH A CAREER AS A PROFESSIONAL CONDUCTOR.

Our postgraduate choral, orchestral and brass band conducting courses build on the success of all our other departments, including the Vocal and Operatic Department, whose Chamber Choir regularly releases CDs to critical acclaim. You will also work with our expert staff, who currently include renowned conductors Paul Spicer, Jeffrey Skidmore, Daniele Rosina, Michael Seal, Ian Porthouse and Edwin Roxburgh.

Choral conductors benefit from a dedicated chamber choir and will enjoy regular rehearsal and performance opportunities. To build your skills in conducting, interpretation and vocal technique, your individual study will be split between conducting and singing lessons according to your needs. You will also have coaching in editing music and managerial skills.

Orchestral conductors will work with our experienced staff conductors and with many distinguished guest conductors who visit for occasional projects, as well as to lead orchestral sectionals, direct new music and conduct some orchestral projects. Learning core repertoire with a pianist, along with podium time with a symphony orchestra and a variety of other ensembles, encourages the development of the wide range of skills orchestral conductors need.

Brass Band conductors will be offered individual tuition from expert staff conductors, and will spend considerable time developing directing techniques in rehearsal and in performance. In addition to attending and participating in scheduled brass band activities, you will be encouraged to explore other opportunities to engage with ensembles, as director or observer, both within the Conservatoire and with professional organisations such as Services for Education and Tredegar Brass Band.

HISTORICAL PERFORMANCE DEPARTMENT

Head of Department: Martin Perkins

IT IS INCREASINGLY IMPORTANT FOR ALL MUSICIANS TO BE AWARE OF THE ISSUES SURROUNDING HISTORICALLY INFORMED PERFORMANCE AS THESE ARE EMBRACED BY THE CLASSICAL MUSIC WORLD AT LARGE.

Since the early 1990s we have maintained a strong commitment to performance practice and historical music through an innovative programme of cross-departmental activities. All of our students have the opportunity to study a period instrument or to have stylistic awareness lessons with specialist visiting tutors.

Regular workshops and rehearsals are taken by leading specialists in the field of period performance. Our full period instrument Capelle Baroque orchestra performs on average once a term, exploring a rich variety of music, from large-scale works to smaller repertoire. Every other year the orchestra joins forces with the Vocal Department to produce a full-scale baroque opera.

Historical Performance Studies is offered as an elective to all students, and encourages them to explore a wide range of music and performance-practice issues from medieval to Classical periods, in practical and theoretical classes. Recent topics have included Baroque dance, keyboard temperament, rhetoric and Renaissance ornamentation.

PEDAGOGY AND COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT IS AN INTEGRAL PART OF OUR MUSIC CURRICULUM AND PLAYS A VITAL ROLE IN EMPLOYABILITY DEVELOPMENT.

Preparing you for a portfolio career is central to our courses at both undergraduate and postgraduate level. Alongside your busy performing schedules, you study, observe and practise workshop-leading and instrumental/ vocal/compositional teaching techniques through our pedagogy and community engagement modules.

At Royal Birmingham Conservatoire, community engagement begins in the first year of undergraduate study and extends to postgraduate level. Workshop facilitation techniques learned in the lecture room are typically developed in early years settings, primary and special schools, care homes and hospitals. Students observe and/or are mentored on their own deliveries in partnership with organisations such as Music in Hospitals and Care, Orchestra of the Swan, Calthorpe Academy and Derby Royal Hospital to name but a few. We are proud to have a thriving partnership with Services for Education, in place for over a decade, where our students engage with Birmingham's Music Service through annual lectures, workshops and teaching placements in tandem with their pedagogy modules.

Partnerships such as this provide opportunities for our students to work alongside professional practitioners in one-to-one, small group and whole class instrumental lessons, or get involved with choir, composition and ensemble training.

We have separate Heads of Organ, Collaborative Piano and Historical Performance. This gives these areas focus and drive, but also allows flexibility to move between them.

The early undergraduate years have certain requirements to establish breadth and rigour. For example all second year piano students study and perform on our two Fortepianos, which is essential to an understanding of classical style. Then you might become a first study Fortepianist, keep Fortepiano lessons in your creative mix, or simply enjoy translating your experience to the modern instrument.

ARCO provides regular distance-learning opportunities for talented musicians who for multiple reasons, do not have access to the same level of musical education as students in the UK. Designed for emerging arts practitioners, Royal Birmingham Conservatoire's courses in Experimental Performance provide you with an opportunity to undertake independent artistic projects in a fully supportive environment.

They enable practitioners from a variety of disciplines (including, but not limited to, instrumental/vocal performance, composition, dance, choreography, theatre, visual and performance art, creative writing) to come together with like-minded people. Our flexible course enables you to mould a programme of study to your own needs and aspirations, and may be approached as preparation for a research degree in music.

It is important that a musicologist also develops complementary skills and/or knowledge outside their specialism which will help equip them for a future career: professional musicologists typically find themselves, among other things, teaching, managing and administering; some even maintain parallel careers as professional performers or composers. Therefore, we provide you with a choice of Professional Development options (shared across our postgraduate programmes) alongside your musicological work to give you the opportunity to develop and/or expand your interests across a range of complementary areas.

The Conservatoire team - which comprises a large number of research-active staff - has a vast array of expertise, allowing us to supervise a wide range of projects, and we are particularly keen to attract those interested in pursuing Master's-level research in our specialist areas. POSTGRADUATE RESEARCH COURSES AT ROYAL BIRMINGHAM CONSERVATOIRE

A PHD AT ROYAL BIRMINGHAM CONSERVATOIRE WILL HELP YOU DEVELOP RESEARCH SKILLS THAT SUPPORT PERFORMANCE, COMPOSITION, OR A SCHOLARLY CAREER.

Whether you are interested in music (including composition, music technology, musicology, performance and jazz) or performing arts (theatre, acting, directing, applied drama, dance and interdisciplinary performance practice), you will be supervised by leading experts in the field. Choosing to study in a conservatoire environment allows you access to top-level performers, enabling you to situate your research in an environment of practical music making and acting.

A PhD enables you to follow a programme of self-directed, independent study, supported by experienced supervisors who are themselves experts in their area. Royal Birmingham Conservatoire operates a system whereby you are able to assign your allocated hours to a number of specialist advisors, allowing you to tailor the support you need to the requirements of your own project. While you will be developing as an independent researcher, you will be supported both by your supervisors and the wider Conservatoire research community. As well as bespoke research skills training for musicians and performing arts students, there are regular opportunities for you to present and share your work with other research students.

Royal Birmingham Conservatoire has a thriving research community, with particular specialisms in composition, music technology, musicology, performance and performing arts. Regardless of your specialism, you will benefit from access to top-level performers and £57 million facilities with state-of-the-art recording studios, concert venues and practice rooms. Research students have access to a dedicated work-space. We have close links with the city's musical and theatrical organisations such as the CBSO, BCMG, The Rep Theatre, Midlands Arts Centre and The Royal Shakespeare Company. Music students are eligible to audition for our ensembles, and in addition both Music and Performing Arts students can take part in a full range of our practical activities and lectures. Our programme offers the flexibility to present your research in a range of formats, depending on the nature of your research, whether it be fully text-based (currently 80,000 words) or practical (composition, performance or scholarly edition) with a written element.

REF2014 confirmed the high quality of our research at Royal Birmingham Conservatoire, which was assessed as being equal third among UK conservatoires in terms of grade point average, and top of all UK conservatoires for 'research power'. 100% of our research impact was deemed 'outstanding' or 'very considerable' and 90% of our research environment was rated as 'world leading' or 'internationally excellent'. Researchers in Music and Performing Arts also benefit from interdisciplinary collaboration through research clusters and wider networks as a part of Birmingham City University.

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JUNIOR ROYAL BIRMINGHAM CONSERVATOIRE

OUR JUNIOR CONSERVATOIRE PROVIDES SPECIALIST MUSICAL TUITION OF THE HIGHEST CALIBRE FOR TALENTED YOUNG MUSICIANS FROM ALL AROUND THE WEST MIDLANDS AND BEYOND.

We work closely with the senior Conservatoire to deliver a shared vision for music education. Our tutors are exceptional teachers and musicians, and include members of the City of Birmingham Symphony Orchestra, professional musicians and senior Conservatoire staff. We typically operate on 30 Saturdays each year during school term-time using the Conservatoire's full facilities.

Our junior courses include:

- Classical music
- Jazz
- Chamber music
- The Young Strings Project (offering string instrument tuition to beginners as young as four years old).

Junior Conservatoire students can also, where the timetable allows, combine elements from different courses to suit individual needs. A strong emphasis is placed on performance opportunities through weekly platforms and termly chamber music recitals, as well as biannual concerts for the larger ensembles in the Bradshaw Hall.

The Junior Conservatoire day

Your Saturdays typically start at 9am and finish at around 5pm. They are long and involving days that demand a lot of enthusiasm and commitment. The make-up and length of each timetable will vary according to which course(s) you choose, and the level you have reached. Younger students will usually begin with a shorter day.

Who should apply?

We offer specialist training to young musicians between the ages of eight and 18 with exceptional potential, and the commitment and desire to realise that potential. Even absolute beginners as young as four years old can study with us through our Young Strings Project.

Where can it lead?

We train our young musicians to achieve their maximum potential, with the aim of reaching a level where they could gain a place at a senior conservatoire or music college. We also offer preparation for the Associated Board exams to grade eight and diploma levels.

Bursaries

There are a limited number of bursaries available including government-funded National Grants, awarded through the Music and Dance Scheme. The value of all such awards is subject to a means test.

Our Music department has a dedicated Professional Development team that run specialist modules on CV writing, audition, interview and time-management skills that are invaluable to our students before they enter employment. Our musicians also have countless opportunities to perform, including paid work through our Book a Musician scheme.

Our actors gain extensive performance experience for stage, screen and radio during each year of training, and in their third year they perform in professional external productions. In their final year they also take part in industry showcases in London and Birmingham in front of agents and industry professionals.

Our Applied Theatre course sends second year students on work experience placements with theatre groups, community groups or schools. Recent placements have included West Yorkshire Playhouse, Big Brum, The Playhouse, mac Birmingham, Birmingham Repertory Theatre, Chickenshed, Birmingham Hippodrome, Pines Special Needs School and Greenwich Young People's Theatre.

Our Stage Management students complete a six to eight week work placement in their third year and recent placements have included the Royal Shakespeare Company, the Royal Opera House, Birmingham Hippodrome, Birmingham Repertory Theatre and the Royal Opera House Muscat in Oman.




Bedroom/study at University Locks
