



Feminist Post-structuralist Discourse Analysis



- '(F)PDA follows Foucault's thesis
- (1980) that the self is not fixed in a set
- of socialized, transferable roles, but is
- constantly positioned and
- repositioned through discourse.
- Individuals both negotiate and are
- shaped by their subject positions
- within a range of different and often
- conflicting discourses, which vary
- according to historical, cultural or
- **social context**' (2002:829).


Feminist Post-structuralist Discourse Analysis




KEY PHRASES THAT COLLOCATE WITH SPREAD:



Discourse Theory and Subject Positions

RADICAL CONTINGENCY

- All subject positions are:
 - Necessarily contingent upon what they are not
 - Constituted by their relationship to other discursive formations
 - Never fully fixed
- 'There is no final, absolute ground, foundation or essence to identity, except for contingency itself' (Phelan and Dahlberg 2011:16)

Discourse Theory and Subject Positions

RADICAL HISTORICITY:

- All subject positions are:
 - Necessarily a result of historical processes and conditions that led to the present moment
 - The result of political processes in the past
 - Hegemonic and mask the alternative possibilities that could have been
- 'All meaning is fluid and all discourses are contingent; it is objectivity that masks contingency and, in so doing, hides the alternative possibilities that otherwise could have presented themselves' (Jørgensen and Philips 2002:37).

The SPREAD of 'homosexual conduct'

The second line of inquiry was a study not of individual homosexuality but of groups, with particular reference to the means by which and the extent to which homosexual conduct *spread* within society.

The SPREAD of 'homosexual conduct'

Would the removal of legal sanctions make it more difficult, or less, for the bi-sexual and young to resist temptation, and would homosexuals be more ready, or less, to break their associations and to seek medical treatment? Would homosexual conduct spread, or losing the glamour of rebellion would it decline?

The SPREAD of 'homosexuality', 'homosexualism', and 'the infection'

- 'One objection to the committee's recommendations was that making legal what consenting male adults did in private would **encourage the** *spread* **of homosexuality'** (November 27th, 1958).
- 'The majority of homosexuals are incapable of withstanding the temptation so to act; that prison is the wrong place for them; and that their presence there spreads the vice among other prisoners' (April 2nd, 1958).
- 'Homosexualism between consenting adults could not be regarded as their affair alone; they were not just corrupting each other; but were liable to *spread* the infection far and wide' (December 5th, 1957).

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
1979-1990: Spread into the heterosexual population

- 'The new scheme would help to test how far Aids has spread into the heterosexual population. (May 20th, 1988)
- 'Are there, for instance, 50,000 carriers of the virus in this country, or twice that number? What is the real extent of the *spread* into the heterosexual population? Just how fast is the disease progressing?' (November 3rd, 1988)
- 'Senior officials at the Public Health Laboratory Service have detected a slowing down of the rate of increase among homosexual and bisexual men, but say that a slow spread continues within the heterosexual population. (November 28th, 1988)


- Vulnerability
 - 1960s: 'Society' is vulnerable to the spread of homosexual conduct
 - 1980s: The 'heterosexual population' is vulnerable to the spread of HIV/AIDS
- Measurement
 - 1960s: Ascertaining the spread of 'homosexual conduct'
 - 1980s: Ascertaining the spread of HIV/AIDS
- Radical Contingency
 - 1960s: 'Society' is heterosexual ≠ homosexual
 - 1960s: 'Youth' are heterosexual \neq homosexual
 - 1980s: Heterosexual people are a 'population' gay men are a 'community'


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


